

Since 2001, Full Circle: First Nations
Performance has produced the annual Talking
Stick Festival, North America's premier multidiscipline Indigenous arts festival, showcasing
talent from across the country and around the
world. This year, Full Circle and Coastal Jazz are
excited to partner in presenting a broad range
of performances, collaborations, and public
activations at the TD Vancouver International
Jazz Festival.

In addition to their live shows throughout the festival, Full Circle/Coastal Jazz 2022 Featured Artists KeAloha and Missy D will be exploring a range of meet-ups, jams, and other outreach activities that touch on collaboration, decolonization, and growing creative spaces that centre marginalized Indigenous, Black, and racialized artists. Quick on their beat, KeAloha and Missy D meet in music beyond genres, thriving on natural rhythms and improvisations. They invite each other and the wider community to consider. how do we relate to Black-rooted music on Indigenous lands? And how do we move forward in solidarity?

Full Circle and Coastal Jazz are also copresenting concerts at Performance Works, The Ironworks, and David Lam Park, as well as a dynamic series of events at Ocean Art Works, where live music and DJs will be performing alongside the cabaret pop-up style surprises



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

JUNE 24 • PERFORMANCE WORKS @ 7:30PM • \$37 INCL. S/C



Sharing stories of ardour, resilience, and self-actualization, Adria Kain's voice, at once powerful and restrained, is a balm for times of tumult and noise. Chronicling a range of experiences, from the palliative effects of the natural world to embracing her identity as a queer Black woman, Adria's new album When Flowers Bloom reminds us what it's like to fall in love for the first time—or to discover an artist whose music can pierce your soul.

Drawing from the wells of Nordic and Gaelic music while adding expansive modernist textures, this transatlantic quintet takes audiences on "a deep listening and thought-provoking journey, chock full of high-end musicianship" (Exclaim!).

ALVARO ROJAS' GRAN KASA

Imagine a '70s prog band, a salsa group, and a string quartet going on a road trip together. Composer/guitarist Alvaro Rojas calls on some of Vancouver's finest creative players to add elements of Afro-Peruvian rhythms and forms to his harmonically adventurous, textural pieces. With Peggy Lee cello, Chris Gestrin keyboards, Meredith Bates violin, James Meger bass, Sam Cartwright drums, and Liam MacDonald percussion, Rojas will dig into tunes from the group's dynamic debut album.

AMANDA TOSOFF FEAT. EMILIE-CLAIRE Rari nw

JUNE 28 • JAZZ AT PYATT HALL @ 7:30PM & 9:30PM • \$42 INCL. S/C

Toronto-based *pianist/composer* Amanda Tosoff is "an assured, forward-thinking voice" (*Vancouver Sun*) who pairs a rigorous command of the jazz piano legacy with an eagerness to push beyond labels. With her latest release—the 2022 JUNO-nominated *Earth Voices*—Tosoff pulls jazz, pop, art-song, and poetry into her deeply emotional, lyrical orbit. Joined by JUNO Award-winning *vocalist* Emilie-Claire Barlow, *saxophonist* Allison Au, *bassist* Jon Maharaj, and *drummer* Morgan Childs, Tosoff's ensemble creates "thoughtful, sparkling, poetically-inspired chamber jazz!" AMENDOLA VS. BLADES W/ SKERIK & CYRO Baptista

JUNE 26 • THE IRONWORKS @ 9PM • \$29 INCL. S/C

The adventurous California-based duo of Wil Blades (Billy Martin, Charlie Hunter) on Hammond B3 and clavinet and Scott Amendola (Nels Cline, Bill Frisell) on drums/percussion/electronics takes "an intoxicating sonic journey" (Jazz-Times) through odd-meter prog, dark-hued funk, Latin jazz, daring improv, and psychedelic dub... but wait, there's more! The incomparable Seattle saxophonist Skerik (Les Claypool, Bobby Previte), and percussionist Cyro Baptista—a long-time John Zorn collaborator who's also worked with Herbie Hancock, Paul Simon, and Trey Anastasio—join in for a wild dust-up full of imagination, humour, passion, and virtuosity.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES

AMIRTHA KIDAMBI / JULIA ÚLEHLA / DARIUS JONES

JULY 3 • THE IRONWORKS @ 9PM • \$29 INCL. S/C

A key figure in New York's experimental scene, vocalist Amirtha Kidambi (Elder Ones, Mary Halvorson) rethinks the building blocks of music through bold improv with a host of innovators. Simply put, "the syllables she sings are express lanes to intensity" (New York Times), while American alto saxophonist Darius Jones "is too good and too different to plug into any kind of pigeonhole" (JazzTimes). Vancouver-based vocalist/composer, Dálava co-leader, and former New Yorker Julia Úlehla is a "captivating Moravian magician" (Downbeat), whose approach is informed by opera training, ethnomusicology, ritual, and a carefully nurtured sense of wonder. ANDY MILNE AND UNISON

JULY 1 • PERFORMANCE WORKS @ 2:30PM • FREE

An M-Base Collective alum and the founder of Dapp Theory, pianist/composer Andy Milne's first foray into the intimacy of the piano trio has proven remarkably successful. With bassist John Hébert and Grammy-winning drummer Clarence Penn, Unison's textured, grooving, emotionally complex The reMission took home Jazz Album of the Year. Group at 2021's JUNOs.

ANTELOPER

JUNE 26 • THE IRONWORKS @ 11:30PM • \$24 INCL. S/C

Anteloper shares the iconic Chicago Underground Duo's "penchant for heavy electronic textures—synthesized bass lines, amorphous acidic squiggles, washes and counter-riffs" (*Chicago Reader*) while adding heavy, cosmic, punk energy and skewed pop undertones. *Trumpeter Jaimie Branch* (Fly or Die) and *drummer Jason Nazary* (Little Women) have been collaborating for years, both playing their main instrument plus *synthesizers/electronics*. With deep rhythmic passages, telepathic improvisations, and effortless melodic negotiations, Anteloper bounds freely over the grassy plains of jazz, electro, and free music.

AUDREY OCHOA QUARTET

JUNE 26 • OCEAN ARTWORKS @ 4PM • FREE

A prolific *trombone* dynamo on the Edmonton scene, 2020 WCMA Jazz Artist of the Year Audrey Ochoa mixes jazz, Latin, fusion, and propulsive pop with a playful sense of humour. Described by mentor and trombone master Hugh Fraser as "highly original and powerfully lyrical".

Ochoa's played with Lew Tebackin, Marcus Miller, and the Temptations.

BEATINGS ARE IN THE BODY

JULY 3 • ROUNDHOUSE – PERFORMANCE CENTRE @ 1:30PM • \$10 AT DOOR

Borrowing the project's name from a work by Canadian poet Meaghan McAneeley, Beatings Are In The Body is a bracingly beautiful collaboration between Montréal's Erika Angell (Thus Owls) on voice/electronics, Róisín Adams (Hildegard's Ghost) on piano/wurlitzer/voice, and acclaimed Vancouver cellist Peggy Lee. Together, they artfully explore how memories, pain, and a spectrum of emotions are stored in and continue to be carried by our physical bodies. A highlight of the 2019 festival, Beatings Are In The Body's relevance has deepened considerably in the difficult interval.

BIG LAZY

JULY 1 • WEST VANCOUVER MEMORIAL LIBRARY @ 7:30PM • FREE

New York-based Big Lazy's music falls somewhere between sultry lounge-jazz and fractured surf-pop. The slinky, smoky vibe evokes film-noir soundtracks, dark alleys and finger-snapping beat poets. Lead *guitarist* Stephen Ulrich is the composer for the HBO series *Bored to Death*. *New Yorker* calls his music "stunningly beautiful." With Andrew Hall bass and Yuvall Lion *drums*.

BLACK GARDENIA FEATURING DAPHNE ROUBINI

JUNE 25 • OCEAN ART WORKS @ 4PM • FREE

Led by the mesmerizing *vocalist* Daphne Roubini, Black Gardenia's burnished blend of vintage jazz, folk, and blues blissfully "transports listeners back to a time of maritinis, lounge suits, and hazy cigarette smoke" (*Georgia Straight*). With Andrew Smith *guitar/ukulele*, Chris Davis *trumpet*, Paul Piqat *guitar*, and Jeremy Holmes *bass*.

BLOWOUT BAND

JULY 2 • ROUNDHOUSE – DAVID LAM PARK MAIN STAGE @ 3:30PM • FREE

No chords and the truth—four of Vancouver's finest musicians let loose on one of jazz's purest forms: the chordless horns/bass/drums group. Brad Turner trumpet, Jon Bentley sax, André Lachance bass, and Joe Poole drums use simple song forms as launch pads for unbridled, swingbased improv in the spirit of early '60s Sonny Rollins and Ornette Coleman.

June 27 • Tom Lee Music Hall (André Lachance Workshop) @ 1pm • FREE

THE BLUE AND GOLD (NDIDI O & TRISH KLEIN)

JULY 2 • PERFORMANCE WORKS @ 7:30PM • \$37 INCL. S/C

Vocalist Ndidi O (JUNO-nominee, WCMA Blues Artist of the Year) and guitarist/banjo player Trish Klein (The Be Good Tanyas) were both established Canadian roots artists when they met in Paris, developed a friendship, and forged a brilliant collaboration. The Blue And Gold reinterpret songs from pioneering Black and Indigenous women—such as Memphis Minnie, Sister Rosetta Tharpe, and Buffy Sainte-Marie—with grit, vision, and soul.

Double bill with Great Aunt Ida

BRAD TURNER QUINTET FEAT. MIKE MURLEY

JUNE 24 • PYATT HALL @ 7:30PM & 9:30PM • \$42 INCL. S/C

JUNO and National Jazz Award-winning trumpeter/composer Brad Turner has been an enormously influential figure on the Vancouver jazz scene since 1997, the year he co-founded the acclaimed Metalwood with saxophonist Mike Murley. For his part, the ever-evolving Murley has played on fourteen JUNO Award-winning recordings since 1990, snagging seven as leader and seven as a sideman

With Chris Gestrin *piano*, André Lachance *bass*, and Dylan van der Schyff *drums*, the quintet's travels overlap with fellow explorers Kenny Wheeler, Motian/Lovano/Frisell, and some of the ECM label's finest sonic cartographers.

BUDDY GUY

JUNE 24 • QUEEN ELIZABETH THEATRE @ 8PM • FROM \$59 PLUS S/C



Eight-time Grammy Award winner Buddy Guy is returning to Vancouver three years after his sold-out 2019 Orpheum performance, but you wouldn't know any time has passed—the 85-year-old blues legend is as dynamic, energetic, and restless as ever. His latest album, The Blues Is Alive and Well, is a triumphant celebration of the music he's played a massive role in

shaping, and features star-studded contributions from the likes of James Bay, Mick Jagger, and Jeff Beck. A barnstorming performer, Buddy Guy doesn't just keep the blues flame burning, he hits it with a blowtorch every chance he gets!

CANABRAVA NOW FEATURING DOUGLAS R. Ewart and Mankwe Ndosi

CAT TOREN'S HUMAN KIND

JUNO Award-winning pianist/composer Cat Toren's "beautiful and adventurous" (CBC) HUMAN KIND channels Alice Coltrane and the free-form, socially conscious jazz of the late '60s, making a powerful and urgent case for jazz's expressive ability to uplift, engage, and unite. With local heavy-hitters Dave Say saxophone, Elisa Thorn harp. Aram Bajakian oud. Tommy Babin bass, and Dan Gaucher drums, the empathic Vancouverborn, Brooklyn-based Toren uses atmospheric abstraction and harmonic lavering to mix deep human warmth with creative fire!


CÉCILE MCLORIN SALVANT

Since winning the Thelonious Monk competition in 2010, vocalist Cécile McLorin Salvant has been blazing trails in jazz and art music, picking up multiple Grammys and a MacArthur Fellowship along the way. But after five critically acclaimed albums, Ghost Song (her new release and Nonesuch debut) immediately occupies a



world of its own. A compact, cyclical, immersive suite of songs populated by distinctly spiritual characters, Ghost Song bears all the signatures of a McLorin Salvant project—thoroughly considered, carefully rendered, and absolute in its cohesion-while also being marked by the assured confidence of a once-in-a-generation artist stepping fully into her potential.







His fellow Seattleite, vocalist Ayesha Brooks (aka Musicbox), draws power from gospel, jazz, hip hop, and rock, while Vancouver innovator Peggy Lee is "one of the world's most accomplished practitioners of improvisational cello" (Musicworks). Joining these West Coast creative delights is Toronto saxophonist/clarinetist Karen Ng. Possessed of a "breathtakingly wide musical scope" (Musicworks). Na moves fluidly between avant-garde jazz, indie, and post-rock communities.



The best jazz and creative music performances are unique and unrepeatable, and the more you see and hear, the wider your world gets. The Vancouver International Jazz Festival has been a connection point for artists from around the world since 1986, and those global influences and collaborations have informed our vibrant local scene over the years, whether from up and down the West Coast, back-and-forth from New York, or in the longtime outside-jazz love affair between Amsterdam and Vancouver.

Throughout the Festival, Full Circle/Coastal Jazz Featured Artists KeAloha and Missy D will explore the manifold meanings and implications of an African art form presented on unceded Indigenous lands, while we bring in the voices and creative spirits of artists from all corners of the globe (and in doing so discover that the globe doesn't actually have corners!). From rural Niger, the boundary-pushing Les Filles de Illighadad return for their third fest appearance, while Europe is well-represented by Sunna Gunnlaugs, FIRE!, Tord Gustavsen, Under the Surface, GoGo Penguin, Youn Sun Nah, and more.

From across our southern border, we have artists repping the ever-vibrant NYC and Chicago scenes (like Jaimie Branch, Jeff Parker, Darius Jones, Samara Joy, Joel Ross, and Thumbscrew), West Coast lights Louis Cole, Wayne Horvitz, and Scott Amendola, Texas funk force The Suffers, LetterOne RISING STARS Giveton Gelin, Immanuel Wilkins, and Dan Wilson, and legends like Buddy Guy and Lucinda Williams.

We also welcome back folks from all across Turtle Island, like Toronto's Tanika Charles, Lina Allemano, Pantayo, Andy Milne, Adria Kain and Jocelyn Gould, Montréal-based creators Malika Tirolien, Thus Owls, and Kee Avil, rural Nova Scotia's JOYFULTALK, and the northern throatsinging sister duo PIQSIQ.

In the spirit of far-flung collaborations, Vancouver stalwarts Torsten Müller, François Houle, Lisa Cay Miller, Gord Grdina, and Cory Weeds will be playing with international guests like Jim Black, Gerry Hemingway, Lucy Strauss, Carl Allen, and Dave Rempis, the acclaimed Orchid Ensemble welcomes Mongolian musician Anand Avirmed, and inter-continental collective Like The Mind pairs local players Meredith Bates, Elisa Thorn, and Peggy Lee with their Swedish counterparts Lisen Rylander Löve, Emma Augustsson, and Lisa Ullén.

It's a full, globe-spanning return to Jazz Fest form, a form that's all about flipping the norms.

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
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
