Vancouver International Jazz Festival Announces New Venue and Programming at The Revue Stage on Granville Island

(Vancouver, BC) – Coastal Jazz & Blues Society is pleased to add a new venue to Granville Island Jazz as part of this year's <u>Vancouver International Jazz Festival</u>. The Revue Stage, located at 1601 Johnston Street, hosts the Festival's Innovation Series presenting five nights of improvisational musicians and electrifying explorations of experimental jazz.

"The Revue Stage is an exciting addition to our programming this year," says Nina Horvath, Executive Director, Vancouver International Jazz Festival. "We look forward to creating a hub for all things jazz during the festival, surrounded by the iconic vibe of Granville Island."

Programming at The Revue Stage includes performances at 9:00 pm nightly from Wednesday, June 29 to Sunday, July 2. Tickets are \$25 plus fees. Weekend performances are followed by an 11:30 pm late show with tickets priced at \$20 plus fees.

- Zoh Amba & Chris Corsano with Lisa Cay Miller; June 28, 9:00 pm One of the
 brightest new stars in avant-jazz, NYC-based composer/saxophonist/flutist Zoh Amba is
 joined by drummer and regular collaborator Chris Corsano, and the striking and
 investigative Vancouver pianist Lisa Cay Miller.
- Farida Amadou with White People Killed Them; June 29, 9:00 pm Bassist Farida
 Amadou (Belgium) and White People Killed Them (US) meet at the intersection of
 performance and politics with scathing electronics, turbulent guitar, enveloping bass
 sonorities, and power-clatter drumming. Presented in association with Vancouver New
 Music.
- <u>Duda / Carter / Wójciński / van der Schyff:</u> June 30, 9:00 pm Polish pianist Joanna
 Duda is joined by bassist Ksawery Wójciński, a major figure in the Polish jazz and avant-garde scene, and two of Vancouver's foremost ambassadors of endless invention,





trumpeter JP Carter and drummer Dylan van der Schyff.

- <u>Viviane Houle's Unsung Songs</u>; June 30, 11:30 pm One of Canada's most dynamic and fearless vocal improvisers, Viviane Houle, debuts an ensemble featuring Jessica Ackerley guitar, Konrad Agnas drums, Clyde Reed bass, Joshua Zubot violin, Chris Gestrin piano, and Jo Hirabayashi's projected, real-time manipulations of Houle's graphics.
- James Brandon Lewis; July 1, 9:00 pm Called "one of the modern titans of the tenor" by All About Jazz, James Brandon Lewis presents a dreamlike mosaic of gospel, folk-blues and catcalling brass bands that has established Lewis as one of the most provocative musical voices of his generation.
- NOW with Farida Amadou; July 1, 11:30 pm Expect an evening of attuned explorations, transformative energy, and open-hearted creativity as bassist Farida Amadou is joined by a cellist of remarkable imagination and ingenuity, Peggy Lee, pianist Lisa Cay Miller, eclectic drummer Mili Hong and featuring the sonic phenomenon that is saxophonist Ida Toninato. - Caroline Davis' Alula ft. Chris Tordini & Kate Gentile; July 2, 9:00 pm This
 Brooklyn-based saxophonist/vocalist's complex, beautiful balance of improv and
 composed material reveals and occludes, taking unexpected flight paths to wherever
 Davis points her remarkable imagination.
- <u>Davis / Lee / Babin / van der Schyff</u>; July 2, 11:30 pm The innovative saxophonist/vocalist Carolyn Davis joins three of the West Coast's most empathic players for a late night of boundless improv. Featuring improvisational cellist Peggy Lee, bassist Tommy Babin and drummer Dylan van der Schyff.

The 38th edition of the Vancouver International Jazz Festival will offer 140 shows, including more than 50 free performances from June 23 to July 2, 2023. The Festival kicks off with a free Downtown Jazz concert series outside the Vancouver Art Gallery and šxwÅənəq Xwtl'e7énk Square and includes marquee shows at Queen Elizabeth Theatre and Vancouver Playhouse, plus club shows at various downtown venues, and culminates on Canada Day weekend at Granville Island venues including Performance Works, Ocean Artworks and The Revue Stage.
